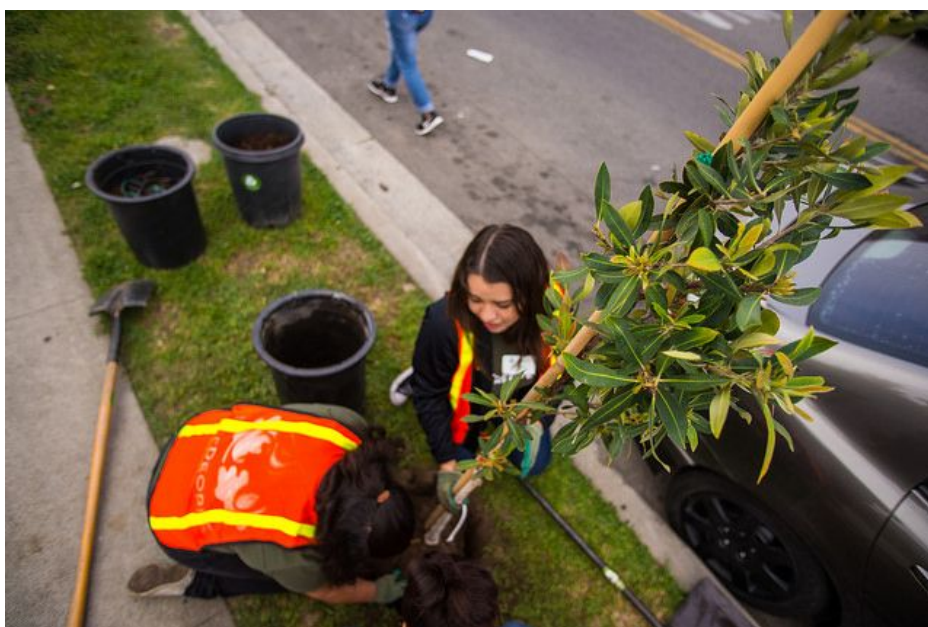

TreePeople Kicks Off 1,400 Tree Planting Campaign

50 volunteers from Huntington Park schools the local community to plant 21 trees

LOS ANGELES (October 12, 2017) – TreePeople is hosting a kickoff event on Saturday, October 14th, from 9am-12pm planting 21 new trees between Saturn Avenue and Hollenbeck Street in Huntington Park. Local youth will lead the event's facilitation.

The event celebrates the launch of a campaign to plant 1,400 new trees in a 3-square mile area of Cudahy and Huntington Park over the next five years along with plans to distribute 1,000 fruit trees to residents over the next two years.

“TreePeople has worked in Huntington Park since 2014. Now, we’re expanding the community’s ‘lungs’ to combat some of the worst environmental injustices in California,” TreePeople CEO, Cindy Montañez said.

Southeast Los Angeles is one of the most heat-impacted and largest food deserts in the LA area.

The campaign’s goal is to increase tree canopy from 15.5% to 17%. TreePeople will plant these trees and provide ongoing care for up to five years to help support any stressed trees. The value the new canopy will bring to the community includes shaded sidewalks, community organizing and a positive influence on public health.

TreePeople has met a \$1 million goal for a 5-year project to help Huntington Park fight climate change and protect public health. Funding is made possible by:
